Class Schedule:

For the course, Dr. Huang will divide Confucius' Lun-Yu into several categories, each representing a grouping of sentences with related subjects. He believes this would facilitate comprehension and focus interest (as contrasted to teaching sentence by sentence from Chapter one to 20).

For the first session, Dr. Huang plans to

1. Introduce the main concepts of Confucianism along with a brief bio of Confucius
2. Learn the concept of "Xiao Dao (Filial Piety)" from Confucius
3. Learn the concept of "Zhi-Hui (Wisdom)" from Confucius

For the subsequent classes, Dr. Huang will present other concepts of Confucianism, such as "Ren (Benevolence)", "Jun-Zi (Gentlemanliness)", "Jiao-You (Friendship)", "Cheng-Xin (Honesty)".

About Dr. David Huang:

Dr. Huang works at Radiation Oncology/Medical Physics Departments at the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center and Long Island Jewish Medical Center. He has served in his current position since 1988 after receiving his post-graduate degree in the US. He is credited with helping to establish the first cancer center (Sun Yat-Sen Cancer Center) in Taiwan.

Dr. Huang is also a famous educator in his field. He taught at several medical schools in US and Taiwan for past years. Currently he is the adjunct professor at University of Missouri, US, and visiting professor at Tsing-Haw University and Beijing University, China. Dr. Huang has studied Confucianism (Four-Book), Taoism, and Buddhism for over 10 years, and formed study groups in the past several years to share his knowledge and insights.

With the belief that the society we live now is similar to the one during the time of Confucius, Dr. Huang encourages people to practice Confucianism for the betterment of their own lives, their own families, and make this a better world for all.
